*Ofc. Williams and Chief Switzer recently attended in the protest in Monmouth. This protest was put together by several local women. There was a good turnout and Ofc. Williams and Chief Switzer both spoke at the protest, then walked with the protesters along N. Main St. to Harlem Ave. and then to the Public Square. The text of Chief Switzer's comments were as follows:

-As a law enforcement officer, the death of George Floyd is sickening and disturbing. As the Chief of Police of the Monmouth Police Department, I am condemning the actions of the officers involved in the strongest possible terms. The decisions made that day by the officers are a terrible aberration and were unconscionable. Four rogue police officers do not represent what I stand for and what the Monmouth Police Department stand for. Community caretaking and public safety are what I am committed to and what the Monmouth Police Department is committed to.

-The reason we as law enforcement are here today is to ensure your voice is heard. We are also here to provide safety for you while walking down the street.
